North Carolina Survivors Have Four Ways to Register for Help from FEMA

RALEIGH, N.C. – If you are a North Carolina homeowner, renter or business owner who sustained property damage as a result of the recent flooding that followed Hurricane Matthew, you are urged to register with FEMA as you may be eligible for federal and state disaster assistance.

The presidential disaster declaration makes federal Individual Assistance available to eligible families, individuals and business owners in Beaufort, Bertie, Bladen, Craven, Columbus, Cumberland, Dare, Duplin, Edgecombe, Gates, Greene, Harnett, Hoke, Hyde, Johnston, Jones, Lenoir, Martin, Nash, Pender, Pitt, Robeson, Sampson, Tyrrell, Washington, Wayne and Wilson counties.

You may register in the following ways:

- Online at DisasterAssistance.gov.
- Call the FEMA Helpline at **800-621-3362 (FEMA)**. Applicants who use **711** or Video Relay Service may also call **800-621-3362**. Persons who are deaf, hard of hearing or have a speech disability and use a **TTY** may call **800-462-7585**.
- Download the [FEMA Mobile App](#).
- Many survivors may not have access to a working telephone or internet, so those who need to do so, can visit a Disaster Recovery Center, or DRC. Find the nearest DRC by going online to www.fema.gov/drc.
 - Survivors requiring a reasonable accommodation (American Sign Language interpreting, Braille large print, etc.) also may wish to visit a DRC. When visiting a DRC, these survivors may call the appropriate Helpline number for support. The toll-free numbers are open from **7 a.m. to 11 p.m., seven days a week**. Help is available in most languages, and information on the registration process is available in ASL at <http://www.fema.gov/media-library/assets/videos/111546>.

Six DRCs are currently open. Hours are Monday through Saturday from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. and Sundays from noon to 5 p.m. (until further notice). They are located at:

You may be eligible for grants for temporary housing and home repairs, and for other serious disaster-related needs, such as medical and dental expenses or funeral and burial costs. You may also be eligible for long-term, low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration. These loans cover losses not fully compensated by insurance or other recoveries and do not duplicate benefits of other agencies or organizations.

Registering with FEMA is required for federal aid, even if you have registered with another disaster-relief organization such as the American Red Cross, or local community or church organization. You must use the name that appears on your Social Security card.

You will be asked to provide:

- Your Social Security number
- Address of the damaged home or apartment
- Description of the damage
- Information about insurance coverage
- A current contact telephone number
- An address where you can get mail
- Bank account and routing numbers if you want direct deposit of any financial assistance.
